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Vicar's Report

This month instead of his customary letter Fr David is sharing with us his report that he gave at our Annual Parochial Church Meeting held on Sunday 19th April 2015 (see article later in this issue). Fr David thanked all who had served St Peter's in the past year, with especial thanks to the churchwardens and the PCC, and then described the vision for the year ahead:

In last year's address I focused on evangelism and our, along with every other parish churches, need to keep this as a watch word in all our thinking and deliberations for the foreseeable future. I pointed out that the relationship or place for the church within the 21st Century community has changed and we need to discover how we can best change with it to continue to proclaim the good news of Jesus a fresh in every age. Evangelism is after all about looking outwards and effecting as well as being affected by the world around us. As Jesus preached and journeyed around Israel this was exactly how he encouraged his message to be encountered. The disciples, as they struggled to take the good news of Jesus out into the world found they too had to respond with the good news in a way that had meaning and understanding for the people to whom they went. Paul and Peter both looked to see what the Holy Spirit was saying to them and helping them proclaim Jesus a fresh in every community they encountered. So too for us today. Repeating what we have been doing in the past is not necessarily a way forward, often it becomes a way to entrenchment and obscurity.

We have been exploring new ways of doing things, of communicating with our parish and reaching out with news of events. We continue to welcome and offer hospitality. We open our doors daily to a great variety of people. This coming year will so more opportunities to share the love of God in Jesus with our parish and hope you will feel able to share in them. An example being the launch of Pebbles a monthly term time service for 0-5s.

Our programme for 2015 has been reviewed and circulated today is a diary of significant dates which will include some new ventures and some new approaches to tried and trusted events. We hope to open up opportunities to encourage the wider community to engage with the church and to develop fellowship between members through which we can strengthen and encourage church life.

Next month will see my third anniversary as vicar of St Peter's; where does the time go? This tends to be a good time to take stock and reflect on a few key elements in church life.

I am using 3D Coaching, a Diocesan recognised Professional Coaching Team to work on a project to do just this which will involve St Peter's in asking a few interesting and informative questions of our leadership and ourselves. The first part of the project is to explore, three years in, what do you want from, expect and wish to encourage in your vicar and team. A questionnaire is being prepared that will help us think constructively about this and help us look to the future development of ministry in our parish. The point in this being that often when working in parish ministry the leadership is left trying to second guess what the needs and expectations of the community might be. This project aims to clarify what you really want and expect and to looking to respond constructively and creatively in a more focused and managed way.

The second project which will follow on will be based of the work of Canon Dr Richard Impey, one time Bishops Advisor and Parish Development Officer of Sheffield Diocese to ask us about our self and how we see our life together now and in the coming years. How can we develop our life of faith together and become a growing and vibrant parish in this part of Ealing. This is still in formation and I plan to have a clearer vision for this in the next month or two.

The third project is to encourage the PCC to explore its method of governance and see how we might do this better; how we might become more proactive in our work for the parish, the sharing of the love of God and include more members in our work. It maybe what we are doing is right for us. It might be with a few tweaks we can do things better. This is to respond more openly to the changing nature of life in the 21st century and how we might more effectively and proactively carry out the work of God together.

These areas have come to mind in light of the work we have already completed in our Mission Action Plan, a revision of which you have had sight of today and the Diocesan project of Capital Vision 2020 where we as a parish are being encouraged along with the rest of the Diocese to see how we might be compassionate, creative and confident in our life of faith and our proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ.

All of which is great stuff. It does not negate our continuing responsibility to pray, study and give. A parish that does not pray is spiritually dead, for without God at the centre of what we do our words become hollow. There are opportunities for prayer through the provision of the daily office and mid-week mass as well as our gathered Sunday worship. As other opportunities arise do come and use these times to be with God. There are opportunities during the year to study. If we are going to be effective evangelists for Jesus we must have some idea what we are talking about. There are many Christians who never open their Bible let alone attend study programmes. I encourage you to take up opportunities that the leadership team offer for study so that you can be informed and effective Christians in a world that is ever more becoming secular and that you can come to know your faith and your God.

Above all else pray for Christ's ministry here, asking God how you might share in God's work.

Passion for Ealing



"Is it nothing to you, all you who pass by?"

This year the Churches Together in Central Ealing made the decision to vary the usual Walk of Witness through Ealing Broadway and instead to present a Passion enactment. This began with worship songs on Haven Green at 10am on **Good Friday 3rd April**. The Reverend Steve Newbold, Vicar of St Stephen's, set the scene and encouraged us to follow Jesus as he carried his cross along the Broadway and to shout and harry him as he made his way to Christ the Saviour's where the crucifixion would take place.

For all present it was an immensely powerful occasion. The juxtaposition of everyday Ealing and the violence of the cross brought home both the reality of public execution and the plight of Christians across the world today persecuted for their faith.

Christine Neyman played the role of Mary very poignantly, and members of our choir supported the music group led by Neil Latchman of St Mary's. All involved in this new way of sharing the Good News on Good Friday deserve our thanks and hopes that it will continue to enrich our Holy Week journey in the future.

On another St Peter's note it was good to see that the stewarding of the event was in the capable hands of Angus McAvoy, our churchwarden, and many from St Peter's donned hi-vis tabards for the morning.

Bright and Early...

The tradition of the Church from earliest times has been to wake early on the morning of Easter Day to celebrate the resurrection by lighting the new fire of Easter and bringing the Light of Christ into the dark church, cold and empty since the liturgy of Good Friday.

This beautiful Dawn Vigil and service echoes the wonder of the women who went to the empty tomb that first Easter Day. In the lighting of the Easter candle and in the singing of ancient words of joy in the Exultet we connect ourselves to all Christendom across the centuries.

We saw many of the horses, including two enormous police horses and it was interesting to talk to volunteers (including Marlene) and officials around the site.

Harvest Fayre Saturday 3rd October 2015





History of the Shrine

The origins of devotion to Our Lady of Willesden are lost in depths of history; but there is evidence by the fifteenth century of a considerable pilgrimage tradition. Pilgrimage medals even now are occasionally found. St Thomas More visited only two weeks before his arrest. It would have been quite an undertaking to visit, as Willesden was just woodland, and bandit country too. But for those living in and around London, it was the perfect way to make a day pilgrimage to an acknowledged Marian shrine without taking the much more arduous route to Walsingham, 120 miles to the north.

In 1538 the axe fell. Along with images from Walsingham and Ipswich, the Willesden image was dragged to Chelsea and burnt in a bonfire.... The Vicar of St Mary's had an enormous fine imposed upon him in perpetuity, for idolatry and superstition. Then at the beginning of the 20th century a new Vicar (Fr James Dixon) decided to throw off this antiquated shackle (and was not punished); and he set about reviving the Shrine. He acquired an image, which was gilded, and made much of the tradition of holy water, which is captured as it rises from beneath the ground here.

70 years later... the then Bishop of Willesden, Graham Leonard, gave new impetus to it. Very well attended annual pilgrimages took place, and a new image was commissioned.

St Mary's, Willesden cares for the Shrine and holds regular services, or you can just take a 266 bus and make a quick visit – it is worth visiting their website for opening times.

May, the Month of Mary

Regular readers of *The Parish Chest* will know that our "Monthly Martyrs" columnist **John Peatfield** is preoccupied with GCSEs this term. He should be back at his laptop for us in September. Instead this month we have a short piece on Mary (in continuity with the article on previous page) and why she is traditionally associated with the month of May:

The practice of dedicating the month of May to our Lady was popularized especially by Pope Leo XIII – beginning in 1883 and concluding in 1889. The reasoning behind it though is less clear.

Some have pointed to the fact that, in classic western culture (both Greek and Roman), May was recognized as the season of the beginning of new life. In the Greek world, May was dedicated to the goddess Artemis and associated with fecundity. Roman culture linked the month of May to Flora, the goddess of bloom and blossoms – this led to the custom of *ludi florales* (or floral games) which took place at the very end of April as a preparation for entering into the month of May.

It seems that this ancient tradition of connecting May with new life and fecundity, led to a realization that May is very much the month of motherhood – this may be the reason why Mother's Day is celebrated during May not only in the United States but in many countries and cultures of both the East and the West. In the month of May, the winter comes to an end and the spring season begins (this was the official beginning of spring in Roman culture). This new beginning and new birth is a testimony to the motherhood of Mother Earth.

The connection between motherhood and May led Christians eventually to adopt May as Mary Month. May is the Month of our Lady precisely as the Mother of God.
